Amy Jacobson will lead a discussion on the major issues that impact women's health and rights, both nationally and for us in in North Dakota at the Fry'n'Pan in Fargo at 7:15 to 8 pm on Nov. 9<sup>th</sup>, 2015.

In 2012, Amy served as the Campaign Manager in the successful effort to defeat a statewide ballot measure that would have enshrined discrimination into the North Dakota state Constitution. And in 2014, she was the Campaign Director for North Dakotans Against Measure 1 - defeating a sweeping 'Personhood' measure by a 2-to-1 vote margin on the ballot.

One of Amy's proudest achievements is co-founding WE Rise: Women Empowered, a women's lobby day that works to demystify the legislative and electoral process. She resides in Fargo, ND, with her husband, Todd, and young daughter, Tess. Amy is privileged to have volunteered for the past four years as the Troop Leader for Tess's Girl Scout troop.

## **AAUW October 12, 2015, Branch Meeting Minutes**

The meeting was called to order by Vice President Jan Jackson at 6:30 p.m.

Ruth Stefonowicz moved and Lisa Rorvig seconded that the meeting agenda be approved. Motion carried.

The minutes of the September meeting were approved as corrected by Alexa Ducioame concerning the Tech Savvy committee's members (adding Liz Cambron and Lauren Singelmann) and intentions (that the workshop will be held even if the AAUW grant is not obtained).

Finance Officer Lisa Rorvig presented the Treasurer's report:

Beginning balance \$630.06 Expenses 249.00 Ending balance \$381.06

Liz Cambron, Co-chair of the Book Sale Committee, reported that the first two days of the sorting schedule will be unavailable, and an extra day will be added on the Thursday before the sale. She circulated sign-up sheets for workers at both the sorting and sale shifts. She also explained the procedure for labeling member donated art and passed out index cards for that purpose. She showed the bag stuffers with information on AAUW and the scholarships that are benefited by the book sale and reminded members to bring plastic bags to the sale for customer purchases. Callers are needed to fill any vacant work slots.

Jocie Izsler, Membership Chair distributed a current membership list and sent around a master copy for any corrections or additions. Jocie reminded us that "Membership is everyone's job."

Program Chair Ruth Stefonowicz distributed the 2015-2016 program booklet and announced the November Branch program will have Amy Jacobson from Planned Parenthood as the speaker. Ruth collected the signatures of all members present and will designate program booklets for absent members.

Alexa Ducioame gave a demonstration on how to access and use the FM AAUW Facebook page and encouraged members to publicize activities via this website.

Old Business: The venue change will be discussed at the November Branch meeting.

New Business: Liz Cambron, Student Affiliate at NDSU, is talking with a women's activist group on campus and using the seven step process provided by AAUW to begin the affiliation of our Branch with NDSU students. Kathy Hogan offered her support for this project.

Jan Jackson announced the book club meeting on October 26 will discuss The Girls of Atomic City by Denise Kiernan at 7 p.m. at the Moorhead Public Library.

#### POWER FAILURE INTERRUPTS MEETING

The lack of electricity prevented the showing of the video "One AAUW," but five Branch members, with the aid of smart phone flashlights, presented information on local implementation of the goals of the organization: Advocacy, Education, Philanthropy and Research.

Yvonne Condell spoke of AAUW's long tradition of providing fellowships for women, which has grown to become the largest source of funding women's advanced degrees in the world. Yvonne is a former chair of the national selection panel with responsibility for choosing fellowship recipients.

Noell Reinhiller described the origins and current status of the two scholarships supported by the FM AAUW Branch: The Grace Hudson scholarship at NDSU and the Dororthy Dodds scholarship at MSUM. Noell distributed a handout depicting both women as leaders in their fields and loyal AAUW members.

Sandy Sidler, Public Policy Chair, supplied copies of the new 2015-2017 Public Policy Program listing a wide range of goals, principles for action and the Biennial Action Priorities, which are support of a strong system of public education, the achievement of economic self-sufficiency for all women, and to guarantee equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse society.

Maureen Kelly Jonason talked about the Research resources of AAUW, from "Health Statistics of Women College Graduates" in 1885, which refuted the theory that higher education causes

infertility, to the current edition of "The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap," which is updated twice a year.

Sara Lindberg explained the efforts of the Legal Advocacy Fund, which aids plaintiffs in workplace and educational institution discrimination and sexual harassment cases and violations of Title IX. The Office for Civil Rights has released a free resource manual for use by Title IX Coordinators, which is available on the AAUW.org website.

Noell Reinhiller suggested that our Branch identify the Title IX Coordinators in our area schools and provide copies of the manual from AAUW. Kathy Hogan recommended we add the college and university coordinators also, and perhaps disseminate the manual electronically. This proposal will be discussed at future Board and Branch meetings.

Sara urged Branch members to view the "One AAUW" video on their personal computers and to take advantage of the useful information on all facets of AAUW that is available at AAUW.org.

The meeting was adjourned.


