
Fargo-Moorhead (F-M) Branch

AAUW January 9, 2015, Branch Meeting Minutes

Present: 27 members, 2 guests, 1 speaker

President Susan Helgeland welcomed all to the annual brunch and introduced Del Rae Williams, the first female Mayor of Moorhead, who spoke on "Politics: Making the Decision."

Ms. Williams thanked AAUW for its community efforts and its mission to empower women and girls, particularly in encouraging women to run for office.

She related the circumstances of her decision to run for mayor when she discovered support for her candidacy at a time that Moorhead needed a third candidate in the race. She expressed her gratitude for the many volunteers who gave their time and money to her campaign.

Ms. Williams is a retired CPA and considers her position as mayor a full time job, with her professional experience an advantage in administering budgets and the city's finances. She said she enjoys being mayor and helping people make decisions.

One of the statistics Williams reported is that of the 800 towns in Minnesota with a population of 30,000, only 18% have female mayors. There aren't any women in similar positions in North Dakota. Not because women aren't qualified. Williams pointed out, "Women are experienced at managing things and are better at asking questions," which are valuable attributes in a leadership position.

For her five year term Williams said she has set a tone of no bickering and no partisanship with her eight male council members. When asked what her major aspiration was going into office she replied that she wanted to change Moorhead's outlook on itself, which she believes has been realized. She also finds the "Coffee with the Mayor" activity to be a successful way for citizens to feel connected with their city government. Williams concluded by encouraging everyone to consider running for office, or asking others to run.

President Susan Helgeland called the business meeting to order.

The minutes of the December meeting were approved.

Lisa Rorvig, Finance Officer, reported last month's balance was \$928.82, and the ending balance this month is \$843.82.

Alexa Ducioame reported that the STEM event co-sponsored by AAUW on January 7 at NDSU was very successful and thanked the members from the branch who volunteered. 175 students attended the classes in which all of the instructors were females.

Sandy Sidler, Public Policy Chair, discussed the Get Out the Vote initiative, with emphasis on informing college students of the requirement to be in the DOT system, to have a government ID, or to vote in the precinct that is on their drivers' licenses. If none of those options is available, the student will need to vote with an absentee ballot. Sandy also reminded us that Equal Pay Day is April 12, 2016.

Alexa and Liz Cambron announced that the half-price dues for half-year membership are available now.

The next branch meeting will be on February 8 at the Biltmore, with a social hour beginning at 5:30, buffet at 6:15, and business meeting and program to follow. The speaker will be Samantha Adank from Concordia discussing their STEAM program.

The meeting was adjourned.





BrainSTEM is a daylong event designed to introduce middle school students to STEM careers. This event also aims to increase the number of women in STEM.


