Happy Women's History Month!



AAUW Affiliate Meeting Minutes

AAUW Affiliate Meeting Minutes February 12, 2018

Present: 24 members, guests, speakers

Business Meeting:

President Alexa Ducioame welcomed all and the mission statement was read.

The agenda was approved.

Pricing: We can now charge \$15 instead of \$20. We also have a student sponsorship, for the first students who come to meetings they can pay \$5 instead of \$15.

The minutes of the January meeting were approved as printed.

Finance Officer Liz Cambron presented the Financial Report. The beginning balance for the month was \$1009.53, and we had \$50 in donations. The new balance is 965.78, and we will be able to sponsor another 8 students for next month.

Continuing business:

Strategic Plan: we will be developing a new plan. Kjersten Nelson, Amanda Savitt, and Evelyn Quigley will be working on the strategic plan. We will be seeking feedback on members' most important issues.

New business:

St. Patrick's Day Parade: Liz presented on our desire to walk in the St. Patrick's Day parade. The route for the parade goes from Old Broadway to the train tracks.

Membership chair Kathleen Nelson presented the membership update. Kathleen welcomed guests to the meeting. She encouraged guests to sign up for our email list and to consider becoming members. Kathleen asked existing members to reach out to lapsed members to encourage them to rejoin.

Public Policy Chair Sandy Sidler presented public policy updates. There was an Equal Pay bill in VA but it died in House subcommittee. Virginia members have spoken out about equal pay. AAUW's cheer of the week was, for the first year, more than a quarter of state legislators are women. North Dakota does not have 25%, but Minnesota does. This month is Black History month. Title IX remains an important issue for AAUW. The jeer of the week: women who drive for rideshare company Uber make 7% less than male drivers. Alexa noted that our program for the next meeting is about Title IX, and our speaker is the Title IX officer at MSUM.

Fundraising Chair Liz Cambron noted that the next fundraising committee meeting is March 24 Saturday 10 AM at Fry'n Pan. We have AAUW gear tonight, and we have a donation box for people to make donations to. Plans for upcoming fundraisers: next month we will ask for candy donations. April we want to collaborate with the Pay Equity task force.

Susan Helgeland presented about pay equity. Mayor Williams and Mayor Mahoney will be in Washington DC on Pay Equity Day, so we will have to decide what to do instead. To get press it is better to do evening than lunch. To discuss: approaches to Pay Equity in city government. We hope to have a Q & A with mayors. They will all sign a proclamation.

Book club chair Sara Lindberg notified the group that book club for January will meet on the 26nd at the Moorhead Public Library at 7 PM to discuss the book *La Rose* by Louise Erdich. AAUW Minnesota wants our favorite books. Sara is also collecting Meet a Member surveys.

The meeting was adjourned.

Program: Women in STEM: Falling in Love with Math and Science, Jane Schuh and Betty Gronneberg

Betty Gronneberg is a software engineer who encourages other women to pursue careers in engineering. Many women are bullied in school for being smart, which discourages them from pursuing STEM careers. People don't know that women pioneered computer science:

Ada Lovelace wrote the first computer program algorithm; Grace Hopper was an admiral, working in 1945 at Harvard, who helped design the first calculator, and was instrumental for creating programming language; and Katherine Johnson, one of the calculators featured in *Hidden Figures*, calculated 1969 the trajectory of space flights in 1969, including Apollo 11.

Betty told the story of her career as an engineer. She grew up in Ethiopia, and her father inspired her to always be curious. She was chosen to study at the first computer science program in Ethiopia while she was studying statistics. Before then she had never seen a computer before. She graduated from NDSU with a degree in software engineering. In many cases, Betty was the only female engineer.

Since graduating, Betty founded uCodeGirl, which encourages girls to learn how to code. She is also a Bush Foundation leadership fellow. She was challenged to think big and different. Betty emphasized that the world is changing, and our children must be prepared to live in a world that requires new skills. There is a skills gap between what workers know and what is required of them. Women are underrepresented in computing, and her organization seeks to change this by demystifying technical skills, providing mentorship, and teaching girls they are capable of doing computer engineering.

Jane Schuh is the director of the Department of Microbiological Sciences and an immunology professor at NDSU. Jane grew up in a small town, and looked up to her father as a farmer, a mentor, and a lover of reading. She developed a love of reading from him and recognizes the importance of telling a story in the sciences.

Jane did her undergraduate and PhD work at NDSU and did a post-doc at the University of Michigan. She made cases both for and against a career in science. With respect to the case against, training is long, hours are long, travel is often required, thinking is hard work for the money, and scientists must wear a lot of hats: poet, prophet, pundit, performer. Regarding the case for a career in science, you get to use your brain, the work is not dull, it is self-directed and flexible, you travel the world, meet and work with fascinating and sometimes 'fascinating' people. Overall, Jane would recommend a career in science. She has had great mentors, colleagues and students. She encouraged more women to get into STEM by starting them young, encouraging them to read, being mentors, and getting out of their way.

Members asked questions about funding for computer science. The speakers recommended that aspiring scientists have a plan, and don't invest too much in one avenue if you don't enjoy it, but feel free to change your mind.

From the AAUW Archives

In the 1970's AAUW cooperated with the YWCA in a Developing Women's Potential group to coordinate women's organizations and publish a directory of them stating the purposes, services and projects offered. This later became the ND Women's Coalition. AAUW also cooperated with other groups in the effort to support passage of the ERA. Six members of the Fargo Branch later marched in Chicago at a nationwide rally for the ERA. Three of those marchers are still members of the Fargo Branch: Bonnie Bernardy, Noell Reinhiller and Sara Lindberg.

AAUW supported efforts to establish family planning facilities in Fargo, furnished tutors for the Right to Read program in the Fargo Public Schools and in 1979 began participating in the Expanding Your Horizons program for young girls.

The Book Club began in 1972. The titles from that first season are surprisingly relevant almost 50 years later, such as Recovery of Confidence, John Gardner, Custer Died for Your Sins, Vine Deloria, The Greening of America, Charles Reich, Future Shock, Alvin Toffler, and Born Female, Carolyn Bird.
