We're another month closer to spring!

March marks the beginning of our Equal Pay Days. March 5th is Asian Women's Equal Pay Day and April 2nd marks All Women's Equal Pay Day. These days measure how far into 2019 women would have to work to make the same as white men made in 2018 when comparing full-time worker's median salary. You can see more of these on our calendar.

Last month we met to make a plan to mark the occasion. We started with a discussion about our own experiences. Some of us at the meeting had experienced pay discrepancies at past jobs.

Steiner, Northern Cass Superintendent, coming to speak about innovations in education. Northern Cass is wrapping up year two of a three-year pilot program to abolish grade levels. Students in grades 8-12 will plan their own courses up until graduation. Instead of traditional teaching where students are taught at a uniform pace, they are taught competency-based education. The hope is that it will encourage students to follow their passions, be more engaged in their learning, and have a better idea of what they want to do after high school. To help with the last goal, the flexible schedule allows more opportunities for job shadows and internships.

Book club is back in full swing. Last week the discussion revolved around *Sister Secrets: A Brother's Reveal* by Matthew Valan. This month book club will be held on Monday, March 25th and we will be reading *Educated: A Memoir*, by Tara Westover. Tara Westover was born in the mountains of Idaho to survivalists opposed to hospitals and public education. She was seventeen the first time she set foot in a classroom and spent the next decade learning. She graduated magna cum laude with a BA from Brigham Young University in 2008, a MPhil from Trinity College, Cambridge in 2009, and a PhD in history from Cambridge in 2014. *Educated* is an account of her journey. The book can be picked up at a discount at Zandbroz.

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AAUW F-M Affiliate Meeting Minutes

Date: February 11, 2019

Present: 11 members and guests

President Alexa Ducioame welcomed all and presented a slide show about AAUW.

The agenda was approved as written.

The minutes of the January meeting were approved as printed.

Financial Report: We covered our meals for the January brunch and made approximately \$37 in profit. Our ending balance for the month is \$2,286.58, and \$1,500 will be donated to scholarships, leaving us with approximately \$700.

Continuing Business:

Women's March: Alexa presented an update on the Women's March. We agreed to participate in future Women's Marches. Evelyn suggested inviting the organizers of the Women's March to a meeting to discuss their experiences.

Strategic Plan Survey Results: Amanda presented the findings of the strategic plan survey. Amanda, Evelyn Quigley and Susan Helgeland will work on developing the strategic plan. New business:

Book Sale proceeds scholarship distribution: Sara Lindberg presented a discussion of the history of the scholarships AAUW Fargo-Moorhead has contributed to using book sale proceeds. Proceeds are 20% to each scholarship, 10% to affiliate's operating expenses, and 50% to AAUW National. We will include an amendment to the distribution of book sale proceeds in the strategic plan. We also discussed funding and planning for BrainSTEM.

Fundraising: We discussed filing for 501(c)3 status. There would be advantages for grant writing and donations, but the filing fee is substantial, and the paperwork could be challenging to maintain. We also discussed how to capitalize on local scholarships, and whether we should continue providing scholarships given the small amount we give. This conversation will continue as part of our strategic planning process.

ND State AAUW Convention 2020: We will be hosting next year's state convention. This year we are piggybacking on the WeRise event in March and will meet on Sunday evening. We hope to take advantage of the opportunity to speak with legislators at that event. We will need to have a committee to plan this event.

Nomination Committee: We need a secretary and a president to be nominated and are hoping to find a webmaster/social media chair. Susan Helgeland, as immediate past president, will be on the committee, as will Bethany Reinhardt, and possibly Arlette Preston.

Membership: Kathleen Nelson presented the membership update. We are now at 38 members. Kathleen and Bethany will prepare a Shape the Future membership event for March. Memberships will be available at half price for 15 months in March.

Public policy: Sandy Sidler presented the public policy update. AAUW supports a bill which would raise minimum wage, and the Johnson Amendment. The Supreme Court temporarily blocked an abortion restriction law from going into effect in Louisiana.

Ethics Measure: Evelyn presented an update on the implementation of the ethics measure. A bill was introduced by Senator Tim Mathern from District 11, which follows the intentions of the

measure as it was voted on, including a study. (See sheet Evelyn passed out) We, as an affiliate, supported Measure 1. Evelyn recommended that we endorse Senate bill 2148, and that a member of AAUW put forward their name to be a commissioner on the ethics commission.

Announcements:

Book club chair Sara Lindberg notified the group that book club for February 25 will be Sister Secrets.

The North Dakota convention will take place at NDWN's WeRise event March 3 and 4. The Minnesota convention will be in Grand Rapids in April.

The meeting was adjourned.

Pay Equity Action Planning – February Program

Alexa presented some facts about pay equity. The average income for a woman working full time is 80 percent of a man's average income. Even controlling for many possible explanatory factors, there is still a 7 percent gap between men and women one year after graduation, and the pay gap increases over time.

Equal Pay Day is when women's earnings "catch up" to men's earnings from the previous year. This year, Equal Pay Day is April 2. This differs significantly by ethnicity, though. There are a number of AAUW resources, including research, guides, and salary negotiation training (including Start Smart and Work Smart).

In small groups, we discussed our experiences with pay equity and inequity. As a whole group, we discussed transparency about salary, the role of HR, the role of women on boards, and our personal experiences.

Minnesota has a state pay equity committee to assess back pay when it has been determined that pay was unequal.

For our goals, we want our goals to be SMART: specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound. Alexa presented an "Is It News?" flowchart to help us determine how we should promote whatever event we decide to coordinate. She also presented an infographic on the differences between tactics, strategies and goals. We also need to address who should tell the story, and what the story should be.

In terms of possible actions, we are considering: newspaper coverage, political advocacy, and salary negotiation training.

If you're not clear on why negotiating matters, renowned equity activist Lilly Ledbetter sums it up brilliantly. "A lot of people think 'Well, I'll take that job. They promised me that raise in six months," says Ledbetter, who visited AAUW's offices after helping us advocate for the Paycheck Fairness Act. But even if the raise comes through, she says, "that money you've lost those first six months, it's gone." That's why "you need to negotiate upfront and make sure you're being compensated ... for your education, your skills and the enthusiasm you bring to the workforce." AAUW's <u>Work Smart</u> is a free tool that teaches negotiation.


